# Pima Helpline Update

Rachel Cummings, Pima County Health Department, provided the group with information on the launch of the Pima Helpline website. The website successfully launched on June 3<sup>rd</sup> and is intended to help individuals easily find mental health and addiction treatment, services, and support. Additionally, Rachel provided contact cards with the website's address <a href="www.pimahelpline.org">www.pimahelpline.org</a>. ### **Update on the Center of Opportunity**

Victor Hightower, Gospel Rescue Mission, provided an update on the Center of Opportunity which opened on June 3<sup>rd</sup>. The facility, open from 7AM to 7PM, had 229 of its 250 beds filled. While the center is willing to help anyone, Victor stressed that the center is primarily for individuals who are not currently receiving services of any kind. Victor also clarified the medically assisted treatment policy for the center, noting that long-term programming will result in individuals tapering off, however, this is not required in the interest of helping as many people as possible. Gospel Rescue Mission's Program Director will be asked to provide additional information at the next meeting.

# **Sonoran Prevention Works Update**

Chris Thomas, Sonoran Prevention Works, informed the group that some outreach teams have expressed concern about encounters with police who have confiscated harm reduction materials and naloxone. Chris stressed that the criminalization of this drug is detrimental, that distributing outreach materials is not illegal, and emphasized the need for messaging to be shared with the broader law enforcement community.

The group also discussed concerns from neighborhood associations regarding outreach materials from Sonoran Prevention Works and needles being found in parks. While it may not be likely that the needles were from the outreach teams, the group discussed approaches to cleaning up parks including taking back used needles. The group noted that there are legal liabilities related to mobile outreach volunteers having used needles, however, these discussions will need to happen at a higher policy level.

### **Report Development**

Mark Person, Pima County Health Department, provided an update on a consolidated report on prescription drug overdoses in Pima County. Mark provided feedback from the survey that was conducted at the last meeting to help guide the development of the report. Key findings included a preference for a quarterly report, interest in types of existing comorbidities, type of opioid-involved in the overdose, and comparison with state-wide trends. Mark did note that some data including the address of the overdose, identifying characteristics, and protected health information could not be shared in the report.



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# **Lighthouse Project Update**

Shannon Fowler, Southwest Institute for Research on Women, provided an update on their services. The Lighthouse Project is a support service system that is both LGBTQ+ affirming and trauma-informed for individuals ages 18-24 that are experiencing homelessness. Additionally, the Lighthouse Project provides trainings on LGBTQ+ topics to service providers.

#### **Oxford House Update**

Matthew Duncan, Oxford House, shared that their organization will be expanding to southern Arizona. Oxford House, which helps to provide housing to help individuals achieve long-term sobriety from all substances, will be opening up one house for men and another for women on July 15<sup>th</sup> with 100 houses planned over the next 5 years. Matthew informed the group that individual living in Oxford houses are self-run and self-supporting, with individuals paying their own rent and running the house democratically.

### **Success Story**

Bryanda Acuña, CODAC, read a letter that an individual had submitted who had gone through the deflection program to receive treatment. The letter expressed appreciation for the deflection program and the officer who helped them through the process. Since the program has started there have been over 400 individuals who have sought treatment through the deflection program.
